The music program will feature saxophonist and educator William (Bill) Scarlett. He will be one of three honorees to be inducted to the Arkansas Jazz Hall of Fame and will perform several sets with Robert "Buck" Powell on piano (AJHF HOF 1995), Joe Cripps on bass, and Dave Rogers at the drums. Two other saxophonists, Leonard Johnson of Little Rock and the late Lin Halliday of DeQueen will be inducted along with Bill Scarlett. The ceremony and concert start at 8 PM in

William (Bill), P. Scarlett, Jr. was born March 6, 1929 in Russellville, Arkansas. He moved to Morrilton (1936 – 42) where he played violin for a year. Then he took up the clarinet at age 10 after seeing Bennie Goodman at San Francisco World's fair in 1939. Bill moved to Salt Lake City in 1942 (his father, Dr. Scarlett was drafted). He got an alto saxophone, good teacher, formed a band with mid-school talents, and

played in Mormon neighborhood churches called wards earning \$1.50 per gig!

Bill moved to Corpus Christi, Texas (1943-44) where he got a tenor sax and was mentored by friend, Eddie Galvan. He taught Bill jazz & how to play it. Upon moving to Little Rock, Arkansas in 1945, Bill played a gig at the Studio Club downtown on 5th Street and with Floyd Sherrod in the old 555 Building on Broadway. A group was formed with Bill Scarlett, Howard Williams, Pat Murphy, Walter Norris, and others devoted to playing be-bop. Howard Williams wrote charts for the big band. The group also was associated with Robert Talley Band considering Talley a mentor and occasionally both groups played as an integrated band! Bill played with a great ninepiece band headed trumpeter Bitsy Mullins. He went on road in 1947 with the Louis Ohls band because Art Pepper was playing alto saxophone.

Bill started college at LR Junior College in 1951 then moved to Louisiana State University in 1953 receiving a Masters of Music Degree in Clarinet and Theory (1956). Moving to University of Tennessee at Knoxville in 1957 to play clarinet with the Knox Symphony until 1983. Bill continued playing jazz all this time starting a big band in 1959, which has now grown into Knoxville Jazz Orchestra (KJO). Over the years he has played with Woody Herman, Jack Teagarden, Charlie Spivak, Les and Larry Elgart. He has done concerts with Ray Charles and Lou Rawlls. KJO played Vienne, Montreux, Ezcaray, Spain Jazz Festivals in 2001. The Orchestra has played with guest artists Jimmy Heath, James Moody, Marvin Stamm, Hank Jones, Mulgrew Miller, and others (google knoxjazz.org). Bill Scarlett continues to play jazz in the Knoxville and area.

It was fitting that Lin Halliday's first record as a leader was called Delayed Exposure, for the talented tenor had already turned 55. He was born in 1936 in DeQueen, Arkansas, raised in Little Rock where he learned clarinet and saxophone and started playing gigs with local bands as a teenager, Halliday has been a professional since graduating high school. He spent time in Los Angeles, playing at sessions under the guidance of altoist Joe Maini. Halliday spent a year in Wisconsin and then in 1958 moved to New York. The following year he was Wayne Shorter's replacement with the Maynard Ferguson Orchestra, and later on he spent time with the groups of Louie Bellson and Philly Joe Jones. After more time in Little Rock, Los

Angeles and also Chicago, Halliday settled in Nashville in 1966. The tenor saxophonist worked in the studios and in local clubs until 1978, when an injury put him out of action for two years. After he recovered, he moved permanently to Chicago in 1980, where he became a major fixture in the local jazz scene. A strong hard bop soloist who can hold his own with anyone in a jam session, Lin Halliday recorded with trumpeter Brad Goode in 1988 and since then has led three CDs of his own for Delmark. ~ This biography largely taken from author Scott Yanow, All-Music Guide Other recordings on Delmark Label included East Of The Sun, Where Or When, and Stablemates (with Eric Alexander).

Isaac Leonard Johnson graduated from Dunbar High School where he would later be the band director. He spent a short time in Omaha, Nebraska. While in Omaha he played in a band. That band would do a two week engagement at the world famous Apollo Theater in New York. He moved back to Little Rock and attended Philander Smith Collage where he played in several bands as well as the orchestra. He was saxophonist in a band with pianist Robert Talley.

Johnson was an influence in getting the Late Arthur Porter, Sr. (pianist) into the Little Rock music scene, teaching and mentoring Art's son, a promising young saxophonist the late Art Porter, Jr. He would do the same for many other musicians. For 4 of 5 years he was the bandleader of the house band at the Westwood Club, one of Little Rock's best-known establishments at the time. They were the house band until the Westwood Club closed its doors. He is a retired band director from Dunbar Jr. High School and still lives here in Little Rock with his wife, Norma.

Mosaic Templars Cultural Center Celebrates Grand Opening Saturday, September 20, 2008

On Saturday, September 20, 2008 in Little Rock, Arkansas the Mosaic Templars Cultural Center (MTCC) will open its doors to the public in the footprint of the original Mosaic Templars of America headquarters building, this time as a museum dedicated to the legacy of African-American culture and business. It has been almost 100 years since the Mosaic Templars organization dedicated its headquarters at the corner of Broadway and West Ninth Street in Little Rock.

"It's quite thrilling to once again see the building in the skyline and to see a new center materialize at the same historic site where the former Mosaic Templars of America headquarters building stood nearly a century ago," said Constance Sarto, director of the center.

September's grand-opening weekend will include a ticketed gala Friday, September 19, 2008, featuring The Count Basie Orchestra, which has already sold out. A public celebration Saturday, September 20th, will feature local community and state leaders who will officially open the museum with a ribbon cutting, followed by tours of the new center and a wide range of entertainment and free activities from noon to 6 p.m. Saturday's entertainment includes: The Hope Drum Ballet, an afterschool program in Hempstead County that teaches drumming techniques and storytelling and builds self-confidence; Afrodesia, a Little Rock band with a world beat sound; The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff Vesper Choir; and 17-time Grammy Award-winning jazz band The Count Basie Orchestra.

There will also be face painting, a caricature artist and other arts and crafts. The public is encouraged to attend.
