1-2-3 Bob Dorough Returns April 18, 2011 Monday Jazz Project at the Afterthought Series

The Monday Jazz Project at the Afterthought will present the original music director of ABC-TV's Schoolhouse Rock, Arkansas Jazz Hall of Famer pianist, composer, arranger, conductor, and vocalist Bob Dorough with Joe Vick on bass and Dave Rogers at the drums on Monday, April 18, 2010, 8 PM, 2721 Kavanaugh, Little Rock. Bob Dorough was born in Cherry Hill, Arkansas and earned a Bachelor of Music degree at the University of North Texas at Denton in 1949. His first album as band leader was in 1956 on the Bethlehem label titled "Devil May Care". He is known as one of the only singers to record with trumpeter and band leader Miles Davis in 1962 recording the tunes "Blue Xmas" and "Nothing Like You", the latter being featured on the 1967 Columbia release "Sorcerer". In 1995 Dorough had a come back on Blue Note Records with consecutive releases Right "Right On My Way Home", "Too Much Coffee Man", and "Who's on First".

In 1971 he received a commission to set the multiplication tables to music and wrote "Three is a Magic Number". This led to his stint as the music director for ABC-TV's SCHOOLHOUSE ROCK, Saturday morning cartoons that entertained and instructed school children during the years 1973-1983. Dorough was inducted into the Arkansas Jazz Hall of Fame in 1998 (www.arjazz.org/ artists/hof/1998), (www.bobdorough.com).

Featured Monday, March 7 is trombonist Steve Suter with Joe Vick on bass and Dave Rogers at the drums. Cover \$5. Steve Suter icurrently is trombonist with Bonnerama. In recent years he has performed with the New Orleans Jazz Orchestra, and sometimes the John Mahoney Big Band, both groups featuring the finest musicians of New Orleans. He has also performed with the Millar Brass Ensemble, Al Belletto Big Band, Gatemouth Brown, Pete Fountain, and Kermit Ruffins. As well as havig tremendous Jazz chops, Suter is an accomplished player in the genres of Classical, Funk, and Rock, no surprise from a trombone player's trombonist (www. trombone-usa.com/suter steve bio.htm)

On Monday, March 14 it's Dr. Barry McVinney on saxophone, flute, other woodwinds with Steve Hudelson on guitar, Joe Vick on bass and Dave Rogers at the drums. Cover \$5. The Trio features Alan Storeygard on piano with Brian Wolverton on bass and Dave Rogers at the drums. Cover \$5. Monday March 28 is Jam Night with Steve Struthers on guitar, Brian Wolverton on bass, and Dave Rogers on drums. Cover \$5, jam players \$1.
