

Walter Norris in Little Rock

Walter Norris may well be the greatest living jazz pianist. This international talent, originally from Arkansas, has traveled the world and received rave reviews from everyone. Tickets will be available in advance of the show, and if you want to attend you should plan on buying them early.



Then, right smack dab in the middle of the summer, former Arkansans **Lee and Betty Tomboulian** will grace the Afterthought with their unique music. This *Robin Williams of the Piano*(**Spectrum**) and his lovely wife will make the long trip from Dallas on 19 July to play the piano and sing.

Kicking off the summer will be Bassist **Ken Walker** from Denver. Former roommate of our own Dave Rogers he is a tall, athletic man who brings a lot of energy to his playing. He is currently teaching at the Lamont

School of Music in Denver. A kick-off is an accurate description of what this great musician will bring to our summer.

The second week of June we have the **Steve Struthers Quartet** with special guest Charles Thomas on piano. They are followed by **Barry Mcvinney** to round out our June, leaving only the Jam Session.

Recover from your Independence Day celebrations with the **Charlie Wood Trio** with guitarist **Calvin Newborn** and **Dave Rogers** on drums. I have just about worn out Calvin's last CD (Flyin' Calvin) and can't wait for this midsummer treat.

Then on the 12th, **Dr. Earl Hesse** (or, as he calls himself, Pete Fountain's younger brother) will entertain. He was here last on a dark and stormy night and he is absolute perfection whether on clarinet or saxophone. **Lee and Betty Tomboulian** and the Jam Session conclude July.

James really goofed up and brought in another great guitarist on a night I'm not scheduled to take tickets. **Michael Carenbauer** will start August right. He's followed by the highlight of our schedule, **Walter Norris.**

We finish the summer as well as we started it. A fine group from Henderson State University, the **Daniel Schoultz Quartet** will be followed by our own **Dr. Rex Bell.** Our Jam Session closes out that month.

The AfterThought will be closed Labor Day. Then the autumnal equinox will be heralded by **The Buck Powell Quartet.** Everyone needs to really remind Buck that he is a saxophone player, so we can convince him to play sax on that date. The final act before the monthly jam session will be local vocalist **Thomas East.** He is local, but he is very entertaining.

Plan on attending Monday nights on a regular basis. It always starts at 8:00 PM MST (musician's standard time). On most of the shows you'll know we're ready to start when the white Geo Tracker screams up to the front of the

When I was 14 years old, Jay and the Americans had a hit song titled 'This Magic Moment'. I remember it, as well as Becky C., as only an adolescent male can. Join us, regularly; and maybe on yet another Monday night the stars will again align, the storms again will blow and yet another group of our fine musicians will reach a magical peak and sweep you along for a magnificent ride.

FALL FESTIVALS APPROACH


