Clarence Aaron "Tonk "Edwards

Tonk Edwards has played with Sarah Vaughn, Dizzy Gillespie, Carmen McRae, Gerry Mulligan, Dave Gruesin, Sonny Stitt, Billy Butterfield, Chet Baker, Roy Hargrove. Not bad, he says, for a guy from Nashville, Ark., where he was born as Clarence Aaron Edwards.

A guitarist, he has played every kind of music from rock-a-billy to Dixieland, and he has performed everywhere from Chaylors Starlight Club in Texarkana to the Montrose Jazz Festival in Switzerland.

But his first love is jazz. He has accompanied Sarah Vaughn many times, winning praise form critics like Leonard Feather of Downbeat. It's hard to believe but Tonk was a established musician playing all over Texas, Louisiana and Southwest Arkansas before he learned to read music.

But he recognized his shortcomings and moved to Texarkana to enroll in Texarkana Junior College where he studied music, developing a taste even for classical music. To pay bills, he drove a dry cleaners delivery truck in the daytime and played in clubs at night. That was when he started singing, which he says "brings a new flavor to the gig."

After completing junior college, he moved to Lubbock and enrolled in Texas Tech University. And he kept playing, mostly country music, traveling to Las Vegas, El Paso, North Dakota. Tonk owes his nickname to Country music. He was playing with Mary and Betty Kirby and had just finished Bill Doggett's "Honky Tonk," a real



Continued from page 1- Hall of Fame crowd pleaser in Texarkana. Betty started to introduce him but forgot his name so she yelled, "Way to go, Honky Tonk." The crowd roared and the name stuck.

But Tonk wanted to concentrate on jazz, so when he got a call to come to Denver, he packed up his family and moved. He played with Dizzy Gillespie and later he accompanied Sonny Stitt at the Senate Lounge in Denver. He even opened a club of his own.

In a couple of years, he moved to California where he met Dave Gruesin, who hooked him up with Gerry Mulligan and Quincy Jones. One night with Jones at the Bel Air Country Club, Sarah Vaughn stepped up and sang with the band. She complemented Tonk's playing and shortly after that he was in her band.

Salt Lake City was Tonk's next stop; he taught guitar at the University of Idaho for four years. He has made other jazz festivals besides Montrose. He played with a group called "New Generations" at the Newport Beach Jazz Festival, and organized his own band to play at the North Sea Jazz Festival. He has also played in Belgium, Paris, Genoa, and Victoria, Spain.

In 1996, Tonk moved back to Nashville, Arkansas. He's made a record celebrating his return home, "Back to My Roots with Jazz." He teaches at a branch of the University of Arkansas at Hope, and he and his wife, Barbara, whom he taught to play electric bass, perform three times a week at a restaurant in Texarkana. Tonk also gives private lessons at his home in Nashville.

Earle Hesse

Probably no one has ever done more to interest Arkansas young people in jazz than Earl Hesse. He could do it because he is not only a teacher of jazz but a performer who can improvise and play any book with any band in the land.


Hesse, who was born in Stuttgart in 1934, moved with his family to Memphis, where his first public performances were in jazz bands on Beale Street while he was a high school student. A music scholarship took him to Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, Texas, where he earned his bachelor and masters degree. He later received a doctorate of arts at the University of Mississippi.

Crowell & Cisco, Texas, and at Goddard High School in Roswell, NM

In 1970, he came home, becoming a professor of music --he taught applied woodwinds-- at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia until he retired in 1997. He was the director of Henderson's prize-winning Collegiate Jazz Band for 15 years. Hesse also was an adjunct professor at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock and Ouachita University in Arkadelphia.

Since his retirement, he is in demand as a studio musician, soloist, lecturer, clinician and adjudicator. Hesse was a member of the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra for 14 years, and still performs with symphonies in Pine Bluff, El Dorado and Tupelo, Mississippi.

He also holds the principal saxophone chair of the Arkansas Wind Symphony, where he was judged the best soloist of 1997 for his rendition of "theme and Variations for Soprano Saxophone."

But his real love is popular music, especially jazz. He has performed with such well-known musicians as Ella Fitzgerald, Buddy Rich, Buddy DeFranco, Lou Rawls, Eddie Fisher, Donald O'Connor, Bob Hope,, Pattie Page, Brenda Lee, Al Hirt, Chet Atkins, Boots Randolph, Ace Cannon, B. J. Thomas, Robert Goulet, and Harry Connack Jr.

In just the last five years, Hesse has been a sideman in orchestras named for Jimmy Dorsey, Nelson Riddle, Jan Garber, Tommy Dorsey, Les Elgart, Russ Morgan and Benny Goodman. He frequently plays on the riverboat Mississippi Queen and for the Jan Garber and the Dick Jurgens orchestras on American Queen cruise ships. Most Arkansans know him as the short fellow with the gray beard who in the 1980's and 1990's played with the very popular Happy Tymes Jazz Band at concerts and parties in Little Rock and around the state.

Hesse has made dozens of records for others as a studio musician but never one for himself. His wife and four children have been pestering him for one, and he has finally done it. It's a CD called simply "Hesse." In an attempt to please family and friends, there's quite a variety of tunes - even a couple of religious and country songs. He hasn't decided yet whether to try to sell it. Many hope he will.

William P. Scarlett, Jr.

William (Bill) Scarlett began his musical career playing the violin at age 9. But when he was 10, his parents took him to the World's Fair in San Francisco where he heard Benny Goodman and was inspired. Ever since he's been playing clarinet and saxophone. Born in Russellville in 1929, Scarlett and his parents moved around the country a good bit, and while a teenager he managed to take lessons from Eddie Galvan and

play gigs with people like trrombonist Jack Teagarden and bop-artist Art Pepper. His family moved to Little Rock in 1945 (Scarlett's dad, a physician, became Little Rock's Health Officer).

Scarlett went on the road in 1947, playing alongside Pepper in the Louise Ohls band. That same year Scarlett was married to Catherine (Katy) Sharp in Mobile, with Pepper as his best man. Returning to Little Rock, he enrolled at Little Rock University and played with Henry Thomas and others on Ninth Street and in an integrated big band directed by Howard WIlliams. Scarlett transferred to Louisiana State University, where he studied classical clarinet under Paul Dirksmeyer. By 1955 he had received a bachelor and masters degree.

In 1957, the University of Tennessee hired him to teach clarinet, sax and music theory, and he has been on the faculty ever since. But he kept playing, gigs on weekends with big bands created by Woody Herman, Charlie Spivak, Bob Crosby, Ray McKinley, Bob Crosby, etc.

For 23 years he was the principlay clarinetist in the Knoxville Symphony. Since 1984 he has played one night a week at a club called Lucille's in what

is called the "Old City" in Knoxville. In 1997, Scarlett was named the Alumnus of the Year by the College of Music at LSU. He was there for the presentation and performed at a jazz concert.

Robert "Bob" Bainum Steele, Jr.

Jazz musician and published poet born June 30, 1937, in Little Rock and died at home June 8, 1994. At 13, he began performing on drums for jazz groups in the area. Steele backed up several celebrities including PHyllis Diller, Cyd Charisse, and Frankie Laine. While a member of the National Navy Orchestra

he was a Founding member of the Sea Chanters, the U.S. Navy Singers, and performed on "The Ed Sullivan SHow" in the late Fifties. As a poet, he published a collection called "A Gallery of Moonmen." His first commission was to write theater music at age 18 for Ezra Pound's translation of Sophocles' "Women of Tracis."

Bob graduated from Little Rock Senior High School (Central), Arkansas State Teachers College (UCA) and received his MSE in Engloish from UCA in 1982. He taught at Scott, Jacksonville, and North Little Rock High Schools and was a noted clinician and judge at the National Jazz Band clinics held for high school students nationwide. As a performer, composer, arranger, and teacher, Bob was an active member of the Little Rock and Hot Springs jazz scene for over thirty years as well as performances with KLRE, KARK, KATV, KTHV, and a KETS-PBS special. He is survived by his wife Bettina Nemec Steele, one son Mark, and daughters Lia Steele, Andrea Thrasher, and Melanie Steele.
